5 mins Welcome to the Animal Handling Session and Rules	Introduction to the Animal Handling Session. Going to meet 5 different animals Rules – 1. Stay sitting, River will come to you with each animal, if you want to touch the animals wiggle your finger at River. If you just want to look, place hands on your knees. 2. Stay as quiet as possible, no screaming or shouting as can scare the animals 3. Washing hands at the end.	1.Teachers can use the Animal Handling Session to introduce the topic of animals. 2. Teachers can use the Animal Handling Session during the term to bring the topic alive with focus on a particular area of leaning; for example diet, habitat, anatomy, physiology and texture. 3. 7 - 10 mins Blue Tongue Skink

- 1. Introduction to Dude the Blue Tongue Skink.
- 2. Country of origin Australia
- 3. Habitat Hot, dry and under bushes.
- 4. Coldblooded
- 5. Camouflage
- 6. Tongue use to pretend that he is venomous or poisonous.
- 7. Ears How they hear with their stomach
- 8. Tail Survival technique by dropping tail.
- 9. Diet Omnivore
- 10. Movement on the floor
- 11. Texture Scales and claws

The Blue Tongue Skink is held by River due the sharp claws. The audience is encouraged to stroke the lizard from head to tail.

7 - 10 mins Corn Snake

- 1. Introduction to either Mia or Zeberdee the Corn Snakes.
- 2. Country of origin North America
- 3. Habitat Hot and dry Corn Fields in holes
- 4. Coldblooded
- 5. Tongue Forked and used for smelling
- 6. Bones Compare humans to Snake. Spine, Ribs, Skull and Jaw
- 7. Not venomous but can bite.
- 8. Diet Carnivore
- 9. Physiology Head, Stomach and Tail.
- 10. Movement on the floor
- 11. Texture Scales

Corn Snake is held by River, only if the individual is confident will they are allowed to hold the Corn Snake on their own. Otherwise finger stroking is allowed.

7 - 10 mins Tortoise

- 1. Introduction to either Coco or Chanel the Tortoises.
- 2. Country of origin Mediterranean
- 3. Habitat Hot, dry and rocky.
- 4. Coldblooded
- 5. Shell protection, camouflage, internal organs.
- 6. Beak Eating and biting.
- 7. Diet Herbivore
- 8. Hibernation
- 9. Physiology legs, face and tail.
- 10. Movement on the floor.
- 11. Texture Shell, scales and claws.

The Tortoise is held by River, just in case the Tortoise toilets. The audience is encouraged to touch the shell, legs and claws.
